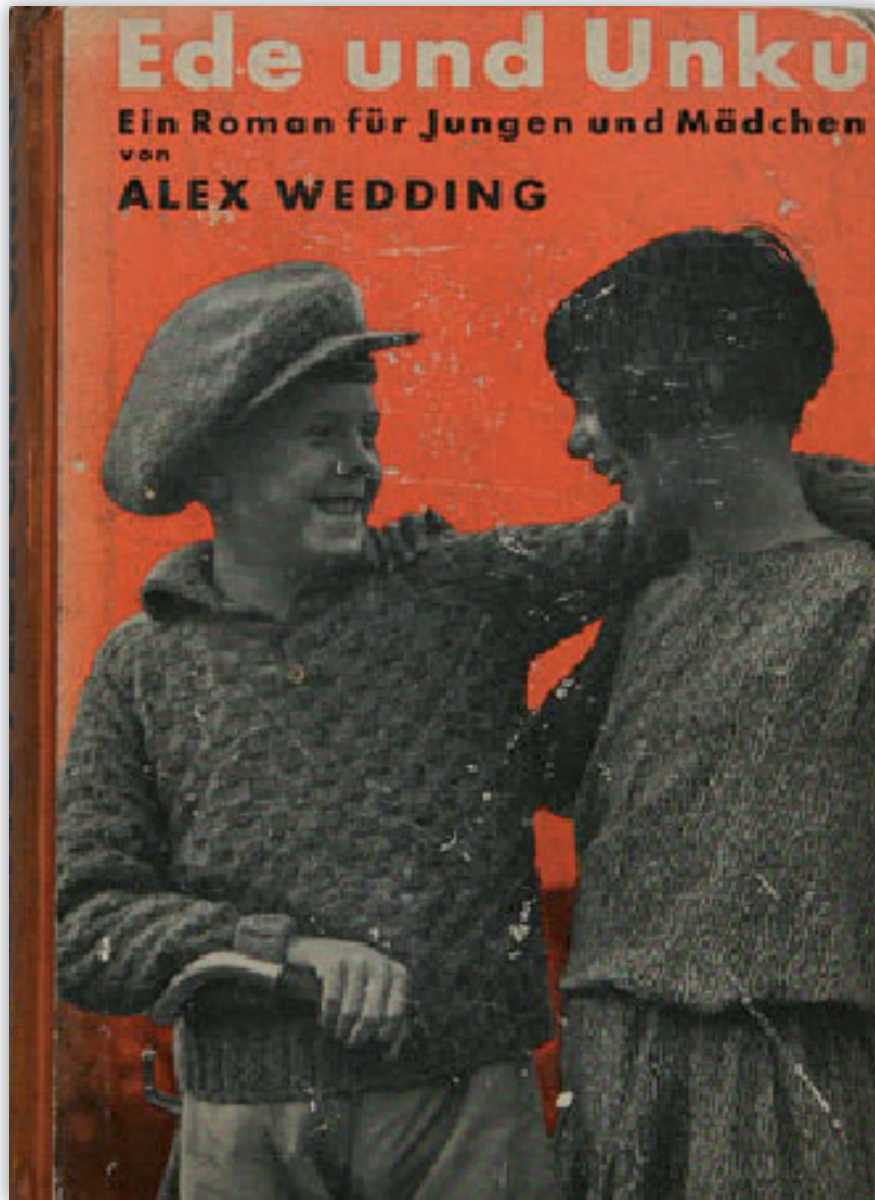


MEDICAL EXPERIMENTS

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Erna Lauenburger was a young Sintiza from Berlin, who grew up and moved to Magdeburg and had a family. In 1943, Erna and her two daughters were deported to Auschwitz-Birkenau, where Erna became a victim of the medical experiments performed by SS doctor Josef Mengele. She was killed with a lethal injection. Her daughters also died in Auschwitz. Her husband, Otto Schmidt, died in Buchenwald concentration camp. Erna Lauenburger had been the inspiration for Alex Wedding's children's book *Ede and Unku*, in which a boy from Berlin makes friends with a Sinti girl. *Ede and Unku* was one of the most popular children's books in Germany in the interwar period and it was subsequently filmed. In 2011, a street in Berlin was named after Ede and Unku.
